

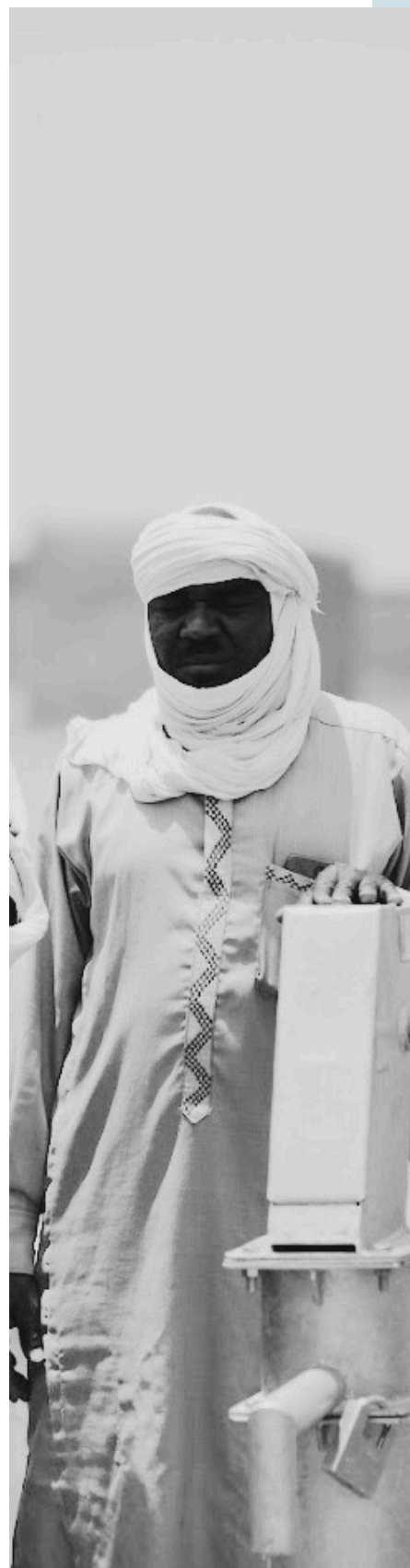

VISION

Care For Others has a vision of working towards a better world free from poverty and helping people towards a better life.

MISSION

Care For Others works to save lives through sustainable and effective emergency relief projects, where the opportunity to promote self-reliance is an essential part of the work.

THE CORE VALUES OF CARE FOR OTHERS

Care For Others aims to support and assist people by providing aid through emergency relief and development projects, as well as awareness-raising and information initiatives. Through its assistance, Care For Others seeks to promote peace, friendship, and understanding across nationalities and peoples.

COMPASSION

Care For Others has an unconditional approach in its work with poor and vulnerable people, providing assistance to all regardless of nationality, race, gender, religion, or social class. Care For Others' support is extended to all people and is allocated based on where the need is greatest.

2

IMPARTIALITY

In its humanitarian work, Care For Others must refrain from involvement in disputes of a political, religious, or racial nature. As far as possible, Care For Others shall maintain neutrality in conflicts, unless one party has committed violations of the UN Declaration of Human Rights. In such instances, Care For Others may seek to highlight unlawful acts through awareness-raising and informational efforts.

NEUTRALITY

Care For Others is an NGO and must, under all circumstances, maintain its autonomy. Care For Others is open to cooperating with other NGOs, provided that such cooperation does not compromise Care For Others' principles or violate applicable laws or proper fundraising practices (as defined by the Danish Fundraising Board).

INDEPENDENCE

Care For Others holds a great responsibility for the financial resources it receives from contributors. To ensure that the funds are used in accordance with the stated fundraising purposes, Care For Others must implement all necessary measures. Members of Care For Others build trust through their actions and by serving as good examples with high integrity.

ACCOUNTABILITY

BOARD OF DIRECTORS' REPORT

2024 has been a year with many facets. We have continued the positive development with increased donations, a strengthened foundation, and an enhanced online presence.

At the same time, the year has prompted self-reflection, where the board has recognized a growing need to strengthen the knowledge base in line with Care For Others' growth. This requires information, learning, and collaboration with relevant stakeholders and experts.

Throughout 2024, the board has been engaged in establishing clear guidelines and procedures that are fundamental to ensuring that Care For Others can grow steadily and efficiently in the future, while also ensuring that its work is carried out according to best practices.

A central focus has been to build a solid organizational structure capable of managing the demands that come with increased visibility and the larger projects and initiatives we are undertaking

We have made significant progress in attracting more donors, which is reflected in a substantial increase in the number of donations and once again confirms that our message resonates with a broader segment of the Danish population.

This growth has made it possible to expand our activities through the hiring of an additional employee and the establishment of an official office. This progress is the result of a targeted effort by both the board and the operations team, who have worked with a clear focus on strengthening Care For Others' visibility and development.

This work, which will continue into the foreseeable future, has not only included organizational adjustments but has also involved continuous knowledge development for our board to provide the best possible support to the people we assist.

At the same time, the board has recognized that it is still on a learning journey and continues to have a need for further knowledge and development. This acquisition of knowledge and experience must be pursued through a stronger focus on participating in more relevant courses, as well as by engaging relevant experts and stakeholders.

As many are aware, the situation in Gaza has been extraordinarily complex and violent, with direct consequences for our local partner organization. Many of their staff and volunteers were tragically affected and lost their lives due to the ongoing bombardments. This created an extremely challenging environment for humanitarian efforts in the region. Due to the extensive loss of life and the destroyed infrastructure, Care For Others has chosen to collaborate with larger Danish organizations that possess the necessary capacity and resources to continue the humanitarian work under such difficult conditions.

The collaboration with these organizations has been essential to ensure that aid could be delivered. It has also provided us with the opportunity to exchange knowledge, resources, and experiences, which have been crucial for maintaining the effectiveness of our projects in Gaza.

On the financial side, the board has worked diligently to build a solid financial foundation for Care For Others, which will serve as the basis for our long-term sustainability. A key initiative in this regard is our focus on attracting corporate sponsors - an initiative we plan to launch in 2025. This effort will not only strengthen Care For Others financially but also contribute to diversifying our sources of income, which is a necessary strategy to ensure the organization's independence and long-term growth.

As most people know, Care For Others only charges a 5% administration fee, meaning that the majority of the funds raised go directly to our projects. However, due to the growth in both donations and responsibilities, we now require more staff to manage the increased workload, and the 5% fee is no longer sufficient to cover our operational costs. Therefore, the board will reconsider the fee percentage at Care For Others' general assembly in 2025.

We will continue to build on the achievements we made in 2024 and strengthen them in 2025, while remaining dedicated to providing meaningful and effective assistance to the people we are able to support through our work.

We are sincerely grateful for the ongoing support of our donors and members, whose contributions make our work possible. Thank you for your unwavering commitment and for being an essential part of our journey to create a positive impact in the world.

Distribution of Zakat funds in Lebanon

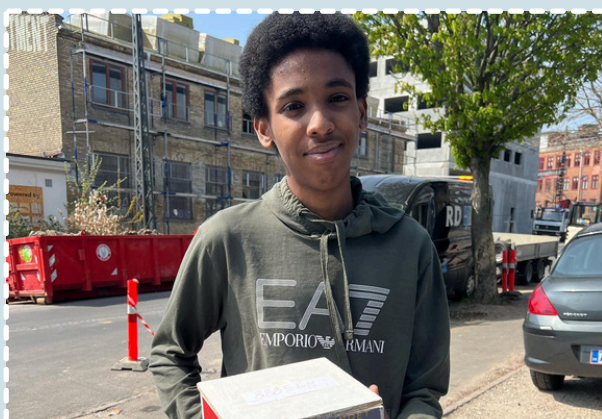
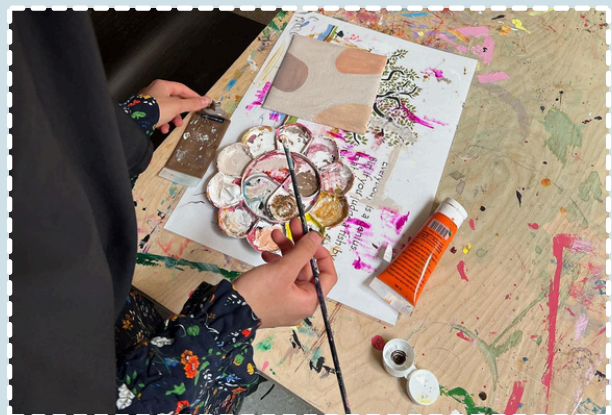


COLLABORATION WITH IVÆRKSÆTTER AKADEMIET FOR BØRN & UNGE

Unfortunately, we have decided to end the partnership after being informed by the Danish Fundraising Board (Indsamlingsnævnet) that our fundraising license did not cover the collaboration with IVA. As a result, we were regrettably compelled to terminate the partnership.

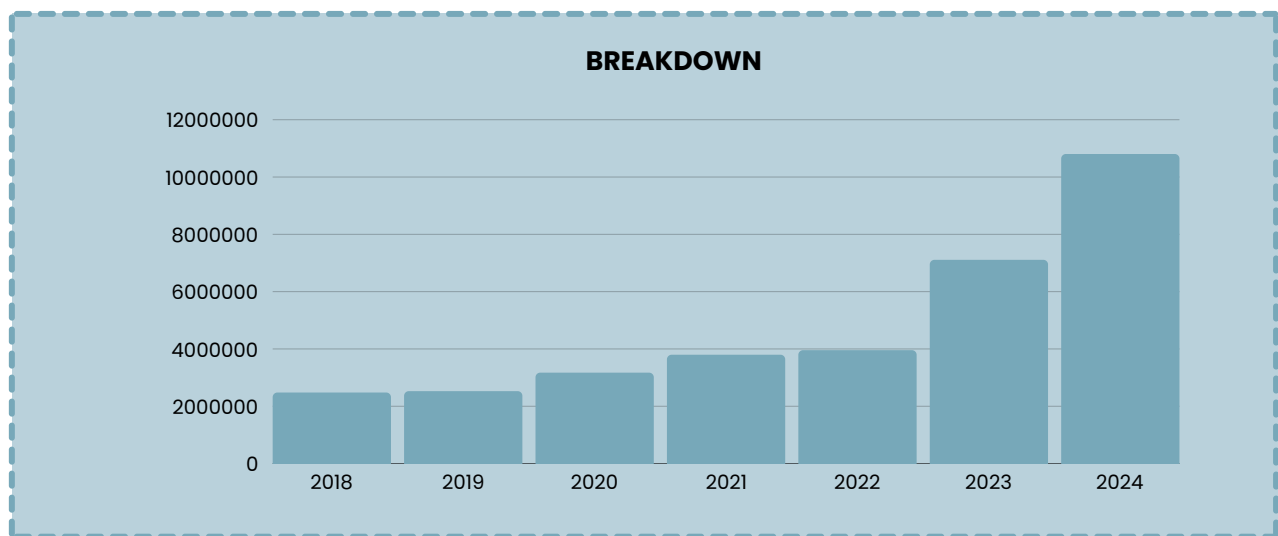
We have learned from this situation and have since implemented improved control mechanisms to ensure that future partnership agreements are in full compliance with applicable regulations. It should also be noted that no earmarked funds were used for the project with IVA.

KEY FIGURES IN 2024

In 2024, Care For Others continued to build on the positive momentum of previous years, further strengthening both our efforts and our emergency relief and development programs. 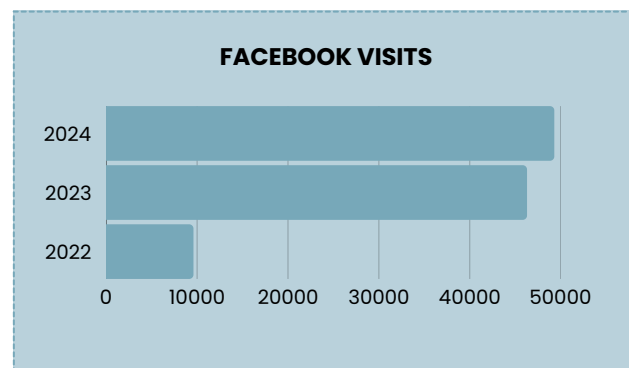
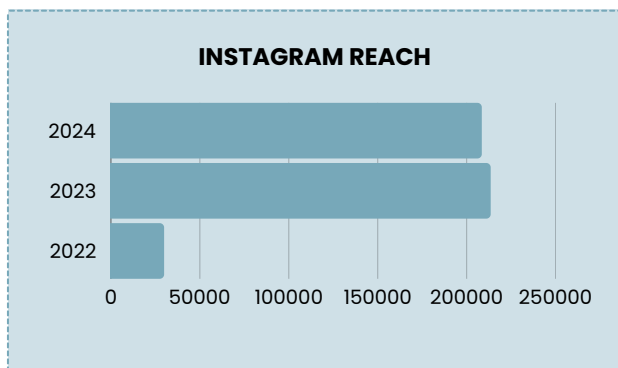
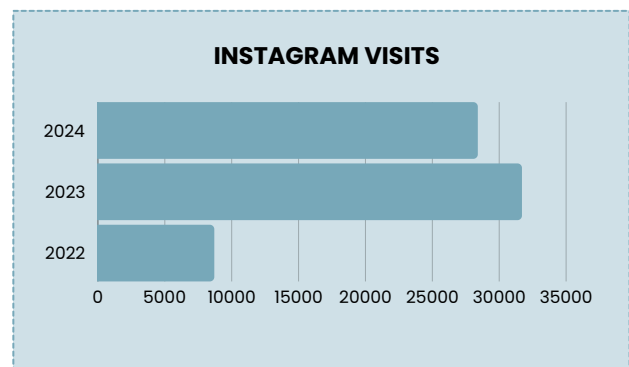
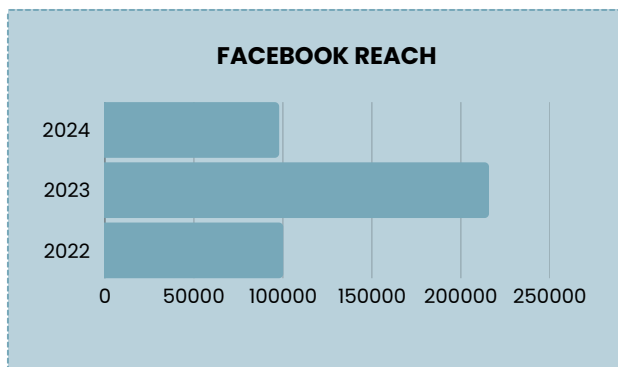


The bar chart above shows the development in annual donations made via MobilePay. From 2018 to 2022, donations grew at a relatively stable rate, while the past two years, 2023 and 2024, have shown significant growth. In 2024, we witnessed an impressive 52% increase compared to the previous year.

SOCIAL MEDIA

Care For Others has primarily been active on social media, where we have created visibility for our work and mobilized support. Until now, our involvement in physical social projects has been limited, but this is a strategic focus area that we aim to strengthen in the coming years to increase our direct engagement in local communities.

Our presence on social media has been a central part of our communication and remains our primary communication channel. The development in reach and visits to our platforms shows a decline from 2023 to 2024. This change can primarily be attributed to a reduced advertising budget in 2024 compared to 2023. Despite this, our organic reach and engagement remain significantly strong.



These figures highlight the importance of a balanced approach between paid and organic reach in maintaining and expanding our engagement on social media. In the coming years, we will work strategically to strengthen our digital strategy while increasing our focus on physical social projects. Our ambition is to establish an even stronger presence—both online and nationwide across Denmark.

STRENGTHENED OPERATIONS

To accommodate the continued growth of Care For Others and strengthen our organizational capacity, we took significant steps in the fourth quarter of 2024 toward a more structured and efficient operation. This includes both an expansion of our operations and the establishment of an official office that now serves as the foundation for our daily work.

In 2024, we had the pleasure of welcoming a new employee to Care For Others. The new team member has joined as a Project Manager and will help strengthen our daily operations and the development of our projects. This recruitment represents an important step in our strategy to expand operations and ensure that we have the necessary resources to support Care For Others' growth and to professionalize our workflows.

Care For Others has taken an important step toward optimizing our daily operations by establishing an official office, which now serves as the base for our activities. The office, located at Vandtårnsvej 62A, 2860 Søborg, provides the right setting for working more efficiently and in a more structured manner. With a permanent base, we are better equipped to coordinate our efforts, improve internal processes, and create a stronger platform for our work.

A STRENGTHENED ORGANIZATION

To ensure a more robust and professional organizational structure, Care For Others has in recent years worked strategically to strengthen its capacity and knowledge base. Part of this effort involves closer collaboration with relevant sector organizations and networks that can contribute to the development of our work and help maintain a high standard in our fundraising and development activities. In this regard, our relationship with CISU and ISOBRO plays a central role. Care For Others became a member of CISU in 2022 and joined ISOBRO in 2024.



Who are CISU?



Civilsamfund i Udvikling (CISU) is an association of Danish organizations working with development and humanitarian efforts. CISU provides advisory services, capacity building (through courses), and access to funding opportunities that members can apply for.



Who are ISOBRO?



The Danish Fundraising Association (ISOBRO) is a trade association for charitable and nonprofit organizations in Denmark. ISOBRO promotes ethical fundraising practices, provides advisory services, and represents the interests of its members.

Becoming a member of ISOBRO marks an important milestone for Care For Others. Prior to our membership, we were approved under Section 8A of the Danish Tax Assessment Act (ligningsloven), which, among other things, sets requirements for the number of members and donors. This approval - along with our admission to ISOBRO - represents a key success criterion and has long been a priority for the board.

COLLABORATION WITH DONEAID

Care For Others has entered into a partnership with DoneAid, a platform where used items can be sold and the proceeds donated to charity. Sellers choose which organization the funds should go to, and Care For Others is among the organizations that can be supported.

This initiative offers both individuals and businesses an easy and sustainable way to contribute while promoting the reuse of resources. The partnership opens up new opportunities for receiving donations.

The collaboration with DoneAid promotes reuse and a circular economy, giving used items new life while the proceeds from sales go to a good cause.

URGENT GAZA RESPONSE

In light of the escalating conflict in Gaza, Care For Others has been deeply engaged in supporting the many families affected by the violence. The year has been marked by significant challenges, but also by tremendous support from our donors, which has enabled us to carry out a comprehensive humanitarian response. We have received a record number of donations, which has been an invaluable contribution to our efforts to deliver emergency aid to the most vulnerable in Gaza.

In the past, we were accustomed to delivering emergency aid without major obstacles. However, this year the situation has been significantly different. The constant bombings and destroyed infrastructure in Gaza have made it extremely difficult to ensure that aid reaches those most in need. It has become a continuous challenge to get humanitarian assistance into the area, and we have been forced to operate in an extremely unstable environment, where even the most basic tasks can be delayed or rendered impossible.

One of the greatest frustrations has been the frequent issues at the border crossings. While we were previously able to get our emergency aid through relatively quickly, we now constantly face the threat of aid being withheld. This uncertainty has been both an emotional and operational strain on our team and our partners, who are doing their utmost to ensure that assistance reaches those in need, even under the most difficult conditions.

When our local partner in Gaza lost a large part of its staff and its capacity was significantly reduced, we entered into a collaboration with Save the Children and CARE Denmark to continue our efforts in the region. We chose to support and help strengthen their existing operations to ensure that aid could still be delivered. Their established networks and resources have been crucial in enabling us to carry on our work despite the many challenges, and we are grateful for the valuable partnership that has made it possible for our efforts to continue.

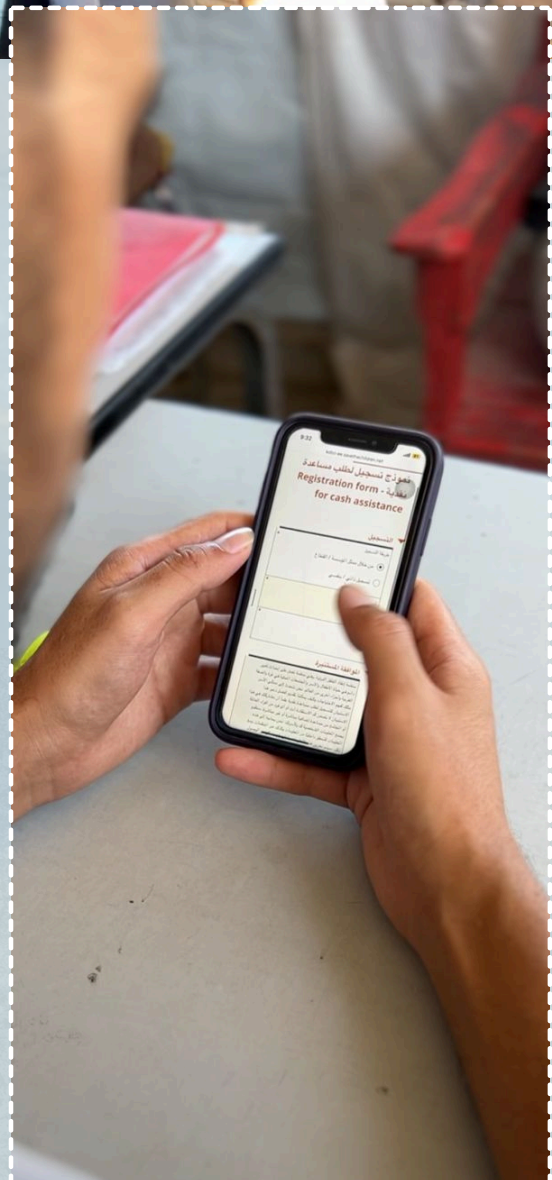


COLLABORATION WITH SAVE THE CHILDREN

As part of our emergency response in Gaza, we implemented a cash assistance project in collaboration with Save the Children. Through direct cash transfers, families received financial support, allowing them to purchase food and other essentials on their own terms. This approach provided families with freedom and dignity in an extremely pressured situation, while also stimulating the local economy.

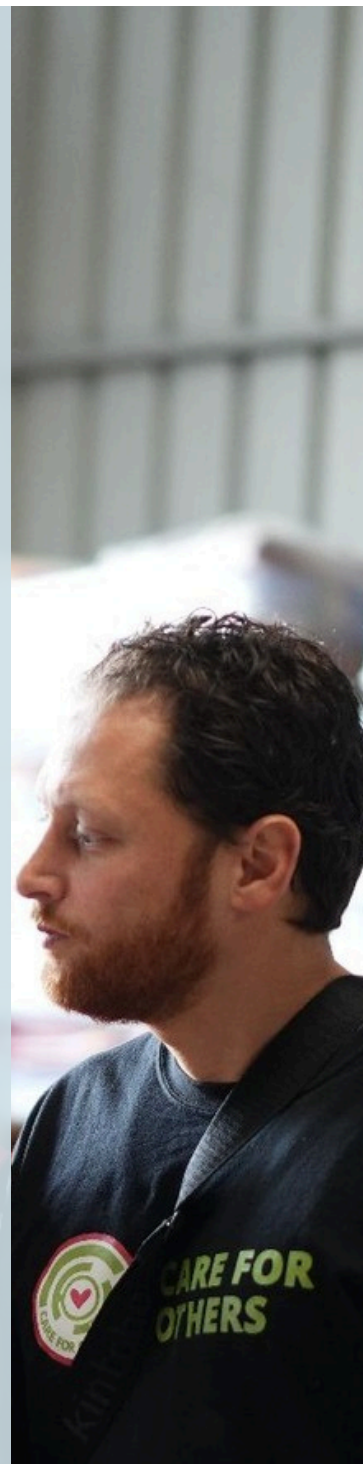
The project also included activities within mental health and psychosocial support (MHPSS) as well as nutrition (food assistance), reaching a total of 1,404 individuals.

The need for MHPSS was particularly high due to the widespread trauma caused by the destruction of war and the constant bombardments experienced by the population in Gaza.



As part of our efforts in the region, we also supported Save the Children's work for Palestinian refugees from Gaza in Egypt, where over 500,000 people have been displaced. Our support helped ensure the provision of food, medicine, toys for children, and other essential resources. In total, 672 refugees received assistance following a vulnerability assessment, and an additional 720 refugees are in the process of receiving support.

To monitor and evaluate the response, we deployed a representative to Egypt who took part in the relief efforts and engaged with Save the Children's local team. The visit provided important insights into the situation of the refugees and the logistical challenges of delivering aid in a new operational context. Additionally, it helped strengthen the partnership and laid the foundation for potential future interventions in the region.



COLLABORATION WITH CARE DENMARK

Our response in Gaza in collaboration with CARE Denmark focused on food distribution, as alarming reports of severe food insecurity began to emerge. Through the project, implemented by CARE International and their local partner, the Palestinian Agricultural Relief Committee (PARC), food baskets were delivered to 792 vulnerable households (5,451 individuals) in Gaza City. These households - including single mothers, families with young children, and pregnant or breastfeeding women - were severely affected by the conflict and had limited access to basic resources.

The project, which was closely coordinated with OCHA and local authorities, delivered aid to particularly vulnerable families. The food baskets contained basic food items such as grains, legumes, oil, canned goods, and high-energy biscuits, and were designed to meet nutritional needs.

Due to the severe restrictions on humanitarian access and the collapse of local markets in Gaza City, this intervention was critical in preventing a further deterioration of food security among displaced families.





IN THE STREETS FOR THE DEMONSTRATION

Care For Others was present on the streets during a large demonstration for Gaza in Copenhagen, where we interviewed participants about their reasons for attending and the messages they wished to share. The aim was to give a voice to those actively showing their solidarity and to foster a deeper understanding of the public engagement with the cause. By documenting the atmosphere of the demonstration and the personal stories, we aimed to contribute to greater awareness of the situation in Gaza and the ongoing humanitarian crisis.



AMARMINOEN: FIT WITH NICK

We were contacted by Nick, a personal trainer and owner of the company Fit With Nick, who wanted to organize a 27 km hike along the Amarmino trail, which circles Nature Park Amager and ends at Dragør Fort. Nick arranged this event to support Care For Others' efforts in Gaza. Many people signed up, and the participants enjoyed a long but rewarding hike through beautiful nature.

In addition to getting exercise and enjoying the scenic walk, they were also able to support a good cause. To take part in the hike, participants were asked to donate a minimum of 100 DKK to Care For Others.

URGENT LEBANON RESPONSE

As the conflict between Israel and Lebanon escalated, many families were forced to flee their homes due to bombardments near the border areas. In response to the urgent need for assistance, Care For Others, in collaboration with our local partner, Takaful For Child Welfare, carried out an emergency relief effort targeting vulnerable and displaced families.

As part of the response, we established a community kitchen where hot meals were prepared and distributed to displaced families. In addition, food baskets, hygiene items, mattresses and blankets, winter clothing, and zakat funds were distributed.



The swift response was crucial in alleviating the immediate distress and ensuring that affected families received the necessary support in an extremely unpredictable situation. The situation in Lebanon has been marked by great uncertainty, which made the coordination of relief efforts particularly challenging. Despite these difficulties, our collaboration with Takaful For Child Welfare ensured that aid reached those in need.



To ensure an effective and well-coordinated response, Care For Others deployed a representative to Lebanon to monitor, participate in, and evaluate the relief efforts. The representative oversaw the distribution of aid, actively took part in the emergency response, and ensured that resources were used optimally. In addition, the visit helped strengthen our partnership with the local organization and provided valuable insight into the challenges faced by the affected families.

FOOD PROJECTS

Providing food to vulnerable families has always been a central focus of our work, and 2024 was no exception. Through our Qurban, Aqeeqah, and Ramadan projects, we were able to deliver essential food supplies to thousands of families affected by conflict, drought, general poverty, and other challenges. Below is an overview of the various projects we have carried out under this theme.

AQEEQAH & QURBAN

Through our Aqeeqah and Qurbani program, we sacrificed more than 200 goats in Malawi. A general Qurban can be offered as part of our work in Malawi—typically as a goat, though it is also possible to arrange for a cow to be sacrificed. Aqeeqah is offered as a blessing to mark the birth of a newborn child.

The meat from these sacrifices is distributed to particularly vulnerable families, who often cannot afford to buy meat themselves and, in many cases, have had no access to meat throughout the year.

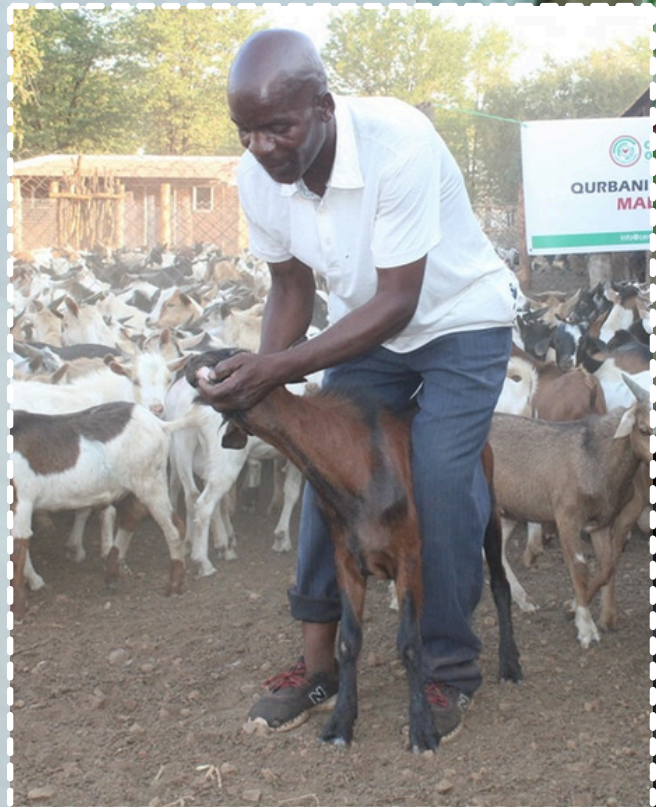
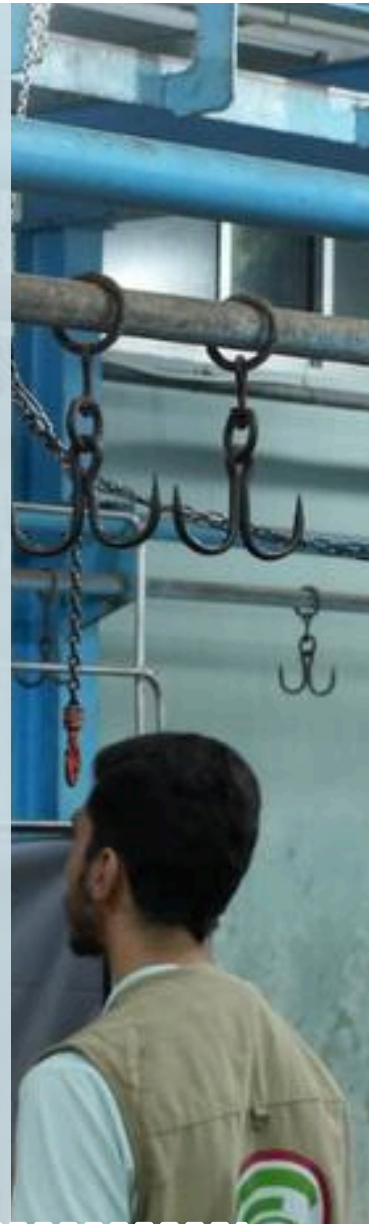


EID UL-ADHA: QURBANI

The Qurbani project, carried out in both Malawi and Lebanon, has had a significant impact on many families living in poverty with limited access to resources. In Malawi, meat was distributed to thousands of people, especially in the southern districts severely affected by drought and food insecurity. A total of 390 goats were slaughtered in the Blantyre district, and 259 goats in Balaka and Neno. As a result, 1,240 families and 7 orphanages received meat.

In Lebanon, 25 calves were slaughtered, providing meat to 2,500 families, and 92 sheep were slaughtered, benefiting an additional 920 families. This project gave these families access to meat—a rare luxury in many of the areas where we work—and brought great relief to those who otherwise could not afford it.

The Qurbani project has made a tangible difference not only in terms of food security but also in fostering a sense of community and solidarity. It has been a powerful reminder of how small contributions can make a significant impact on the lives of people in need.



RAMADAN 2024

As in previous years, Ramadan 2024 was a truly special month, marked by overwhelming support from our donors. Throughout the month, we received substantial contributions, and activity on our social media platforms and in our inbox was high.

During the first 20 days of Ramadan, we focused on our Hot Meals campaign, providing iftar meals to vulnerable families in Malawi and Lebanon. At the same time, our efforts in Gaza continued through a separate fundraising initiative.

In the final ten days of Ramadan, we concentrated exclusively on our emergency response in Gaza, setting an ambitious goal of raising one million DKK. Thanks to the extraordinary generosity of our supporters, we surpassed this goal and reached a total of 1.4 million DKK, allowing us to significantly expand our aid efforts. Ramadan 2024 once again demonstrated how compassion and community can create meaningful impact.

Ramadan 2024 not only demonstrated remarkable support from our donors but also highlighted a special contribution from the youngest members of our community. Two children, Hira (5 years old) and Ejup (4 years old), took the lead in raising funds for Gaza, showing that compassion and commitment know no age.

Hira took the initiative to start her own fundraiser and successfully donated 2,524 DKK to Care For Others. Her effort is a beautiful example of how even the smallest can make a big difference.

Similarly, Ejup, together with his little brother, raised 1,355 DKK for Gaza during Ramadan. His willingness to help shows that even the youngest can take responsibility and contribute to positive change. His dedication is an inspiration to us all, and sincere praise goes to their parents for supporting and encouraging their children's initiative.



During Ramadan 2024, we supported vulnerable families in Malawi through the distribution of hot meals and food packages. A total of 2,323 iftar meals were served at four different mosques in Blantyre. Additionally, 160 iftar food packs were distributed to mosques, schools, orphanages, and institutions, benefiting 1,800 individuals. These packs included 10 kg of rice, 5 kg of sugar, and 1 kg of salt. As part of the initiative, we also distributed 730 Ramadan food parcels, reaching 3,716 people in impoverished rural areas. These parcels contained approximately 20 kg of maize flour, 5 kg of CSB porridge mix, 1 kg of soy protein, 1 kg of sugar, 1 liter of cooking oil, 500 g of salt, 150 g of tea, and three bars of soap.

As part of our efforts in Lebanon during Ramadan, we supported vulnerable families with iftar meals that included rice, meat, yogurt, dates, dessert, and juice. A total of 3,983 people were reached.

Additionally, fidyah and kaffarah funds were distributed in Lebanon in the form of cash assistance.



ZAKAT-FUNDS

Every year, we receive a significant amount of zakat, which we handle with great care and respect. In accordance with the eight categories outlined in the Qur'an, we ensure that these funds are used strictly for their intended purposes and cannot be applied to all types of projects. Zakat is distributed to the most vulnerable and marginalized members of society, with priority given to those in greatest need.

In 2024, Zakat al-Fitr was distributed to especially vulnerable individuals and orphaned children in Lebanon immediately after Ramadan. This support enabled them to celebrate Eid with greater ease and dignity. Additionally, Zakat al-Maal was distributed as part of our emergency response in Lebanon during the conflict, providing 145 families with cash assistance to meet their urgent needs. In both cases, the funds were distributed in the form of cash, offering recipients the flexibility to address their immediate circumstances.

Zakat al-Maal was also distributed in Gaza through our collaboration with Save the Children, making it possible to support families affected by the severe humanitarian crisis.



INSTITUTIONAL PROJECTS

MASJID IN MALAWI

In 2024, we began the construction of masjid in Malawi, which will serve not only as places of worship but also as vital community hubs for local populations. These buildings will become centers for learning and social connection, where both children and adults can gather and grow together. In addition to religious activities, the masjid will host literacy classes and offer education on cultural and social topics relevant to the village. They will function as community centers where people can learn, share knowledge, and strengthen intergenerational bonds.

We have already received strong support for this project, both from local communities in Malawi and from our donors. This support highlights the importance of the initiative to those it touches and underscores the role it will play in fostering both spiritual and social development in the areas where we work. The project aims to create more than just a place of prayer—it seeks to build spaces where people can come together, learn, share experiences, and form strong communities that can grow and thrive over time. We are deeply grateful for the support we have received and look forward to continuing the construction of these vital centers for community and learning in Malawi.

BACK TO SCHOOL INITIATIVE IN GHANA

Many children in the Volta Region of Ghana live in poverty, and for many of them, acquiring basic school supplies such as backpacks, pencils, and notebooks is a major challenge—yet these are essential for their education. Through the "Back to School Initiative," we aimed to equip these children with the basic tools they need to focus on their schooling. The project was fully funded by Care For Others and implemented by our local partner, ADANU.



Through this project, we supported 100 students from two different schools, including both lower and upper primary levels, in the Ho Municipality of the Volta Region, Ghana. The students received backpacks filled with books, pencils, pens, and other essential school supplies, enabling them to start their education with the tools they need.

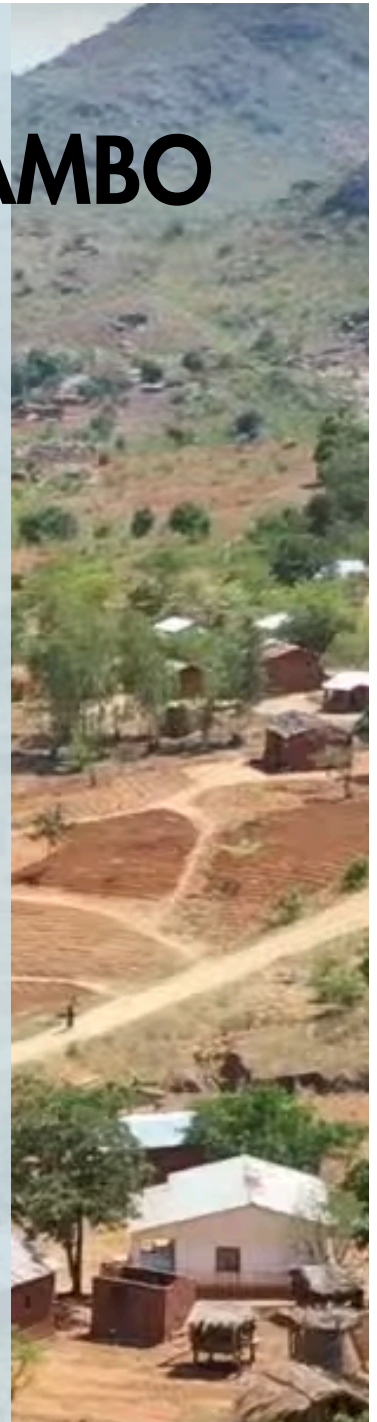
This initiative not only improved the children's access to education but also provided them with the resources necessary to strive for a brighter future.

INTERVENTION IN CHIWAMBO

In 2024, we carried out a project in Chiwambo village in the Mwanza District of Malawi, where we had previously built a masjid. The project was funded through general, non-earmarked donations and aimed to improve food security in the village, which had been severely affected by climate change and agricultural challenges. Cyclone Freddy in 2023 and the El Niño-related drought had significantly reduced agricultural production, leaving many families in serious food insecurity. Local families were surviving on green mangoes, as their food stores were completely depleted.

As part of the intervention, we delivered food packages to 150 families. Each package included basic food items such as maize flour, soy, oil, salt, and soap—enough to last for three months. In addition, we provided local farmers with agricultural inputs, including maize and pea seeds, fertilizer, and pesticides, to help them improve their crops and secure a better harvest. This support enabled them to harvest their crops in approximately four months—just as their food packages were running out.

This project was a vital part of our long-term commitment to supporting the most vulnerable communities and contributing to sustainable development in Chiwambo village and in Malawi more broadly.




SPONSORSHIP PROGRAM

Our sponsorship program continues unwaveringly, and we are proud to support over 900 children every month across Lebanon, Palestine, and Yemen.

However, in 2024, we have faced significant challenges—particularly in Gaza—due to the escalating war. Our local partner has had to navigate incredibly difficult circumstances. They have suffered the loss of many staff members and volunteers, and many of the children and families we support have been forced to flee to various parts of Gaza. As a result, it has been difficult to provide regular updates about the children, which has been frustrating for both us and our sponsors.

Despite these challenges, our local partner has continued their efforts with dedication, ensuring that many of the sponsored children still receive support. Regular sponsorship funds have been delivered through the channels that remain accessible. In cases where communication with a child and their family has been interrupted, the sponsorship amount is held by our partner until contact can be re-established. If communication is permanently lost, or if something has happened to the child, the funds will be transferred to support another child—with the sponsor's consent.

We are deeply grateful for the understanding and continued support shown by our sponsors during this difficult time, and we remain committed to continuing the program despite the challenges.

WELL PROJECTS IN MALAWI

In 2024, we raised funds for 12 wells in Malawi, which now provide water to thousands of people in some of the country's poorest regions.

The selection of villages in need of water was carried out in close collaboration with local authorities and village leaders. Several villages had themselves requested wells, while others were referred to our local partner by other organizations operating in the area. A technical team from our local partner organization, Gift of the Givers, together with water engineers from the Blantyre and Thyolo districts, visited each village to verify the water need. After confirmation, two possible drilling sites were identified in each village. A geophysical survey was also conducted to ensure that the selected locations had sufficient groundwater and were suitable for drilling.

Five of the wells were constructed as general wells, funded by a collection of small donations from many different donors who, together, made each well possible. The remaining seven wells were donated by individual contributors who covered the full cost of a well.

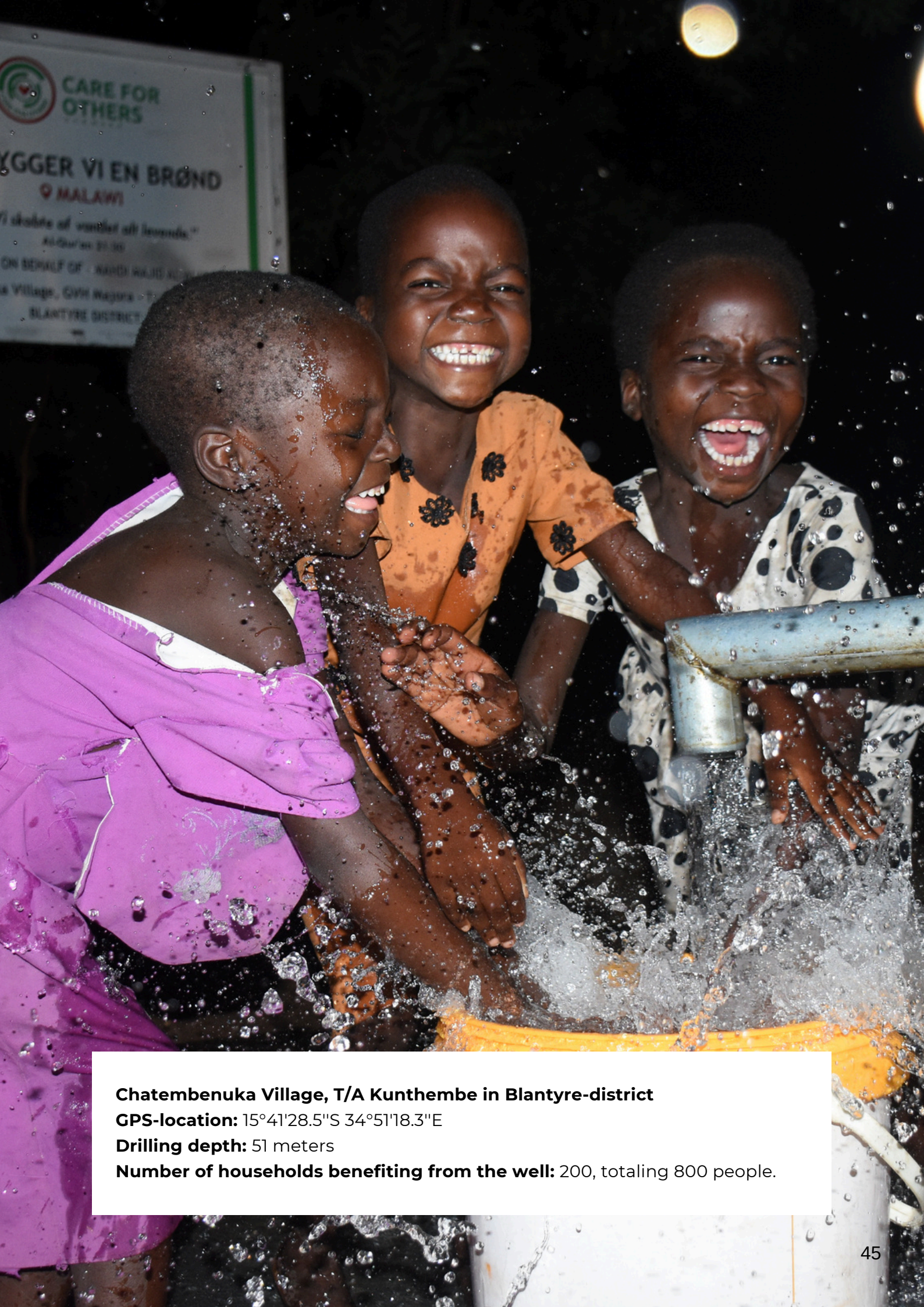
